Apart from a few scattered remarks to the effect that death may not turn out to be "the end," most of Kierkegaard and Death leaves aside the topic of the afterlife, in accordance with what is stated by the editors in their Introduction, i.e., that Kierkegaard's work is primarily oriented toward finite

Summary. Kierkegaard wrote *The Sickness Unto Death* under the pseudonym "Anti-Climacus," the same pseudonym under which he wrote his two most important

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religious works, *The Sickness Unto Death* and *Practices in Christianity*. The “sickness” in the title is despair: despair is the sickness that everyone has until they die. *Anti-Climacus* defines despair primarily as a sickness of the self.
