Figurative Language - A Cheat Sheet

Dramatic monologue refers to a type of poetry. These poems are dramatic in the sense that they have a theatrical quality; that is, the poem is meant to be read to an audience. To say that the poem is a monologue means that these are the words of one solitary speaker with no dialogue coming from any other characters. Think of one person standing alone on a stage speaking to an audience.

What is a dramatic monologue?

Steinbeck utilizes foreshadowing in Of Mice and Men in a very subtle manner. Most readers are shocked by the ending of the novel. However, Steinbeck incorporates an earlier scene in the story that mirrors and hints at the final outcome. This foreshadowing takes place when the character Candy's dog is shot as a "mercy killing."

Example 3. Personal contrast usually takes place between two characters, but it can also happen within a single person!People often talk, for example, about how Thomas Jefferson was a man of contrasts: he wrote beautifully about freedom and equality, yet he owned slaves; he always loved solitude and the countryside, yet he spent his whole life in crowded cities working on politics.
